# My Perspective of Things

Serving as the newsletter editor since April 1993 has given me many opportunities to voice my opinion of the current issues, although I have usually reserved that space for others. But today I feel compelled to establish my perspective of the current issues before us, since I was chosen by this board of directors to serve as its Secretary and also selected to voice CORA's position in Nashville at the last three Tennessee Conservation League's Summit Leadership Conferences. I have carried your opinions to the TCL and to the

Tennessee Wildlife Resources
Commissioners and to the top officials
within the Wildlife Agency. These
meetings have allowed me to privately
discuss CORA's concerns on issues
directly with Director Myers and the
individual Commissioners as well as
officials from the governor's offices. I feel
as if I understand the complexities of
some of these difficult issues more than
most.

When the Elk restoration program needed someone from the grass roots public to make a formal request to the TWRA Commissioners in August of 2000, I was chosen to carry this very important CORA resolution to the Commission. I stood proudly before that panel of powerful men and women as I read aloud for the entire room to hear the CORA resolution officially requesting the TWRA return the ELK to these native lands from where they have been missing for more than 150 years. I would like to thank this board for allowing me to be the spokesperson for such an important moment in time.

Spending so much time in Nashville dealing with current issues like the Elk program and now the hot potato "Off Highway Vehicles" has given me quite an education about the inner workings of the TWRA and TCL. This past April 13, I was elected to the Tennessee Conservation League's Policy Advisory Committee (CPAC) to serve for a term of three years. I will carry CORA's message to this new position as well as my own opinions about the current issues. As board members, you must make your opinions known to me. Without a clear understanding of your position on an issue, I cannot fully represent your desires. Rest assured I have my own opinion, but when I represent CORA I set my personal opinions aside. I am very comfortable expressing CORA's position on the issues. But again it is CORA's board of directors' job to make sure I fully understand the opinions of this

group.



The current challenge before us is the OHV issues. We have worked with this issue since the beginning of the Royal Blue WMA. When it became obvious that a roads and trails map was necessary and the new area manager did not understand the hundreds of trails and road systems, I decided CORA should attempt to produce an accurate map, if possible. I went to the map store and purchased the four topo quads and several colored markers with my own money. I then lobbied the CORA board of directors to select ten knowledgeable members to help determine which roads and trails CORA should request to remain open year round, which trails should be closed and which trails we had no opinion about. That group of CORA members plotted and updated the many trails not found on the topo maps. Then, through a color coded system CORA provided TWRA with a detailed map which included many of the hidden trails. That piece of map work was adopted by the managers of the Royal Blue WMA. That map remains the most accurate representation of the area available today.

This roads and trails issue has been the single most problematic issue for the group. The idea that CORA should have some control over the roads and trails systems is a popular concept within the CORA membership. The control of the opening and closing of specific roads and trails has caused more grief between the TWRA's area management and the

ORA board members than any other single issue. Management by popular vote is the very reason the TWRA is insulated politically from the normal

workings with the governor's office. The concept of management by popular vote is not the way TWRA has educated its WMA managers. When the management plan calls for a road or trail to be open or closed it should be the area manager who makes that call, not by a popular vote from a group of local users.

Consider that Royal Blue has 17 major entrances and 55 minor entrances with more than 800 miles of trails. Mix in about 300 new users each weekend running up and down the trails and one can soon see the potential problems with so many users and out-of-state users who are just here to use our land and go home when they are finished.

It's no great secret that the area's trails system is being taxed to the max. The influx of new users is increasing at a staggering rate. Just ten short years ago, users were mainly CORA members and local folks. The trails were used but did not suffer too much abuse. Today, the abuse of the trail system is extreme. Damage to the trails and to the environment, mostly through runoff into the streams and creeks is a major crisis. It is only a matter of time before someone from the water quality control or the TDEC begins to investigate the damages. Things could then change quickly, forever.

On Thursday, May 31, the TWRC voted to charge a tax on the users of the RBWMA and anyone who uses the land, including local users like you and me, and starting now we will each have to pay a users' fee of \$50.00 a year or \$10.00 a day to use the trail system. "Times, they are a changing," and now is the time for CORA to realize that the control of the

roads and trails must be placed in the hands of the area manager and his staff. I'm sure many of you will not be very happy with my opinion on this issue. But I feel the need for a roads and trails committee is a thing of the past. We must realize the total scope of the issue and move to negotiate into a position of oversight. If the area manager closes a road or trail it should be for a good cause. If we do not recognize the reason for the closure, we should ask the manager for an explanation. We probably cannot change anything, but maybe we will at least learn the justification for the closure and get to voice our opinions. I think we have served as a valuable asset to the public in the roads and trails committee. I also believe we have outlived our ability to be of service in this area of management. Let's let the professionals do their job.

In closing, I would like to thank all of you who have trusted me to represent CORA's board of directors. It has taken a massive amount of time and effort, but it has resulted in major sense of accomplishment and pride. I have never been prouder to have served an organization. This is a group of great citizens who are truly the founding father's of the Royal Blue Wildlife Management Area.

Ray made a motion for CORA to recommend trout restocking in the following creeks; Cove Creek, Montgomery Creek, Buffalo Creek in

Scott Co. This motion was seconded by Don Dilbeck, the vote carried.

Officer Akins said they had lost another cow Elk for an auto accident on HWY 63. Akins reported a big bull Elk is showing up in Elk Valley near the mouth of Lick Fork in the Big Bottoms.

President Asbury discussed the Champion Land getting into TWRA hands, a short discussion of the local group involved that might have input in a program of Timber presale and if CORA would want to attend any of the other groups' meetings to discuss cooperation of all of the groups. Ray and Lee discussed the taxes paid to Campbell County on the Champion property and the possible loss of the tax income for the county.

#### **Review Old Business:**

**New Business:** President Asbury read a CORA resolution statement on reopening the Norris Dam's Cove Creek State Park and the Indian Mountain State Park.

Special Guest Mr. Michael Butler and Mr. Ralph Jordan with the Tennessee Conservation League were present tonight. Butler discussed the upcoming TCL Summit Meeting to be held on December 13 in Nashville at the TCL offices. The purpose of the Summit is to discuss the TWRA's plans and funding issues for the next three to five years. CORA plans to send a representative to the meeting to relay CORA's position on those issues.

Butler also discussed the idea of holding an Elk festival in the spring. A discussion of sponsors and location were had. Ideas about approaching the county's leadership to help put the program together were also discussed. Ray Wilson indicated that CORA should talk among the board members about CORA's interest in this program. President Asbury said we would discuss the issue and get back with Mr. Butler. Butler said he had spoken with Larry Marcum about TWRA providing public viewing opportunities on the WMA.

Mr. Ralph Jordan discussed the TCL's policy board. Mr. Jordan is available to attend CORA meetings and to represent to the TCL board the CORA board members' positions on the issues as a group.

Other issues discussed by the TCL and CORA board members were the Tennessee Young Sportsman program which is an outreach program that would appeal to the local young children to teach them how to enjoy the outdoors. A short discussion about the Tennessee Deer Registry program backed by the TCL was also held.

The CORA meeting was also attended by TWRA's Officer Dan Hicks who gave report about the Elk program. Officer Hicks reported that 16 Elk have been

lost. Fourteen dropped collars were found. During the latest tracking TWRA has located 56 of the Elk. Two of the Elk are located in Catoosa, and that is the farthest they have roamed. Hicks reported TWRA intends to use heat detection devices from airplanes to locate some of the Elk not collared later this month.

Officer Hicks said the Elk are using the release site very well at this time. Hicks also indicated that TWRA plans a supplemental feeding program for the Elk using Alfalfa hay to help them through the stressful winter period. Hicks indicated TWRA is looking at stocking-a possible 100 additional Elk this winter and are holding meetings with UT to plan the next release in January or February.

President Asbury discussed the additional South Cumberland land purchase proposed by TWRA. CORA and RMEF have been asked to help raise approximately one million dollars to help in the funding of the purchase. A short iscussion was had about ideas in the request. Asbury also discussed the tax problems Campbell County would face if the land becomes public. A discussion about raising the funds to pay the taxes on the property each year was had.

Meeting dismissed at 8:25 pm.

It was agreed that after the committee checked into the road closings, CORA will request TWRA's explanation as to why those roads in question are blocked.

**Review Old Business:** The CORA board of directors changed the regular January 2002 meeting to the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday in January, that being on Tuesday the 8<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 pm.

CORA has been requested to attend a Summit Meeting being held by the Tennessee Conversation League in Nashville in December. The purpose of the meeting is to allow groups from across the state to voice their ideas to TWRA as to the direction the sportsman of the State would like TWRA to proceed. Three, five and seven year goals will be discussed along with other ideas that need attention.

A discussion of who will attend the Tennessee Conservation League meeting on December 13, 2001. President Asbury asked Ray Wilson if he could go to the meeting. Ray indicated he would like for Terry Lewis to represent CORA at the meeting. Asbury then asked Lewis if he could go to the meeting in Nashville. Lewis agreed to attend the Summit Meeting on the 13<sup>th</sup>. President Asbury then read the board's recommended three, five and seven year goals CORA would like to see TWRA management consider at the Summit Meeting.

Don Dilbeck made a motion for CORA to pay Lewis for his expenses for the trip to Nashville. Asbury seconded the motion and the vote passed.

President Asbury spoke about Ellis Bullock who is in bad condition healthwise. A benefit for Bullock will be held on Saturday December 8th to raise funds for Bullock. Donations will be accepted and several CORA members donated money for Bullock.

Asbury discussed the offer of 12 million by Rex Boner to purchase the land from International Paper Co. Lee indicated Rex Boner had been outbid by another firm and the price is around 14 million now. Approximately ten million dollars has been raised and another four million is still needed. It is still unclear where the additional funds might come from to help with the purchase. Lee asked if anyone had any suggestions as to how to help raise the additional funding.

The REMF gun raffle is to be held on December 8th at 7:00 pm at the Sports Shop to support the newly formed local chapter named the Upper Cumberland Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation. The Elk festival to be held sometime this spring came into question. Asbury said CORA should raise the question at the gun raffle to check out the local interest in a festival. CORA will ask around to check interest.

The National Wild Turkey Foundation has started a new local chapter and a banquet will be held on Feb. 15th at Hacks Party Barn. A gun raffle and prizes will be available.

December 13th. Lewis reported that the meeting appeared to be a large success as approximately 30 leaders from different sportsmen's groups were invited to the first Summit meeting. Mr. Gary Myers from the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency was a guest speaker discussing many things including the proposed purchase of the two tracts of land including the 81,000 acres of Champion Lands currently owned by

International Paper Company. Mr. Allen Gepheart was also a guest speaker covering the financial requirements and current TWRA budgets. Also discussed were license increases for hunting and fishing. Wetland funds and legal discussions about the use of wetland funds for upland purchases. Also discussed were other funding issues for the agency.

Lewis read many sections of a report issued by the TCL covering the Summit Meeting. Another Summit Meeting is to be held to review these and other issues facing the Tennessee Sportsmen on January 28th, also in Nashville. Lewis was asked to attend the 2nd Summit Meeting and to report his findings to the group.

A lengthy discussion on the TCL Summit Meeting was had by many board members and questions and debates were had on issues like license increases, land purchases and many other issues were discussed at length.

President Asbury discussed going to Elk Island to get more Elk this year. Lee had reserved two spots to go along with the TWRA to get the Elk. It was decided that Leonard Hooks would go first, and Scott Lee would be on the second trip to Elk

Island with Terry Lewis going if one of the others could not go for some reason. Those who want to go to help must qualify with the requirements of TWRA. A clean driver's license is a must. A motion was made to allow Leonard Hooks, Scott Lee and Terry Lewis to go if they qualified, motion carried.

Lee read a card of thanks from the Bullock Benefit fund thanking CORA for all their help in raising over \$6,400.00

The Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation's newest chapter, the Upper Cumberland. Chapter of the RMEF, held their gun raffle at the Sports Shop and the winners were: Jerry Crutchfield, 1st place, with a new Remington 7mm mag. Rifle; Bill Walden placed 2nd with a new Remington 870 shotgun, and Mr. Fred Jordan was the lucky number three, winning a new Ruger 22 rifle. Review Old Business: Ray Wilson reported he wanted to submit a copy of the Elk release tape produced by TWRA to the local TV station to run the tape several times. Everyone agreed that it would be a great idea and for Ray to proceed.

President Asbury discussed the many bills before the legislature for the portsman of Tennessee. Of those bills the OHV program is the most critical issue. President Asbury asked Secretary Lewis to explain the issues on the table at this time and the impact of those issues. Lewis explained the OHV bills as it stands and answered many questions, a discussion was had by many.

President Asbury took a poll of the board members to see who rides and hunts from ATV's. The results of the poll were: all but one member rides and hunts. Asbury asked the board members what position the group is going to take towards this issue. A very large discussion was had on the multiple use concepts.

President Asbury held another discussion concerning the amount of taxation through registration fees to OHV owners. The amount of registration in the current bill before the house committee being discussed is as follows:

For machine values up to \$1500.00 the fee is \$25.00

For machine values up to \$2500.00 the fee is \$50.00

For machine values over \$2500.00, the fee is \$75.00

The board members felt that the fees were higher than they would like to see.

President Asbury outlined CORA's position of multiple uses and a small discussion was had.

Treasurer Ray Wilson discussed the upcoming Elk release to be held on February 14th at 10:00 am. Secretary Lewis asked TWRA's Fred Jordan if CORA members were invited to attend the release. Fred indicated that CORA and the public could attend this release, but everyone needed to be prepared to walk from ½ to ¾ of a mile due to road conditions.
